254 TO AGREE SECTION S106 PARISH INDEMNITY AGREEMENT

The parish council has been asked to sign the agreement to accept £198,402.17 under the terms of Section 106 Agreement for the provision of teenage recreation facilities and towards the cost of building a new multi-purpose pavilion on the gifted land on the site at Cambridge City Football Club, Sawston. This is S106 money for the land north of Babraham Road (S/3729/18/FL).

It was *proposed* by Councillor Kieran Cooper and *seconded* by Councillor Sue Whitney to *accept* the S106 money - £198,402.17.

255 TO AGREE QUOTES FOR ARBORICULTURIST FOR TREES IN THE VILLAGE

Councillor Kevin Cuffley explained that we recently agreed to use an arboriculturist to advise on trees in the village but they are no longer trading. The clerk had two previous quotes. This was discussed at length.

It was **PROPOSED** by Councillor Brian Milnes and **SECONDED** by Councillor Kevin Cuffley to obtain three quotes for an arboriculturist every three years and when residents ask for adhoc trees to be looked at, we collate the requests and ask the arboriculturist to come out and inspect the trees when there are a few to look at and advise. If there is a report of a dangerous tree from a resident, we will ask our head grounds keeper to inspect as he has some knowledge and we can take immediate action if need be.

256 TO DISCUSS RESIDENT REQUEST TO DONATE AND PLANT TREES IN THE VILLAGE

Councillor Jayne Merrick explained that a resident has requested two trees to be planted in memory of two of her friends. The resident is willing to pay for the trees and happy with any two trees and to be planted anywhere within the village. This was discussed and agreed that as we also have funding from the Innovate and Cultivate fund for planting trees and wild flowers, we should include these two trees that the resident wishes to donate.

Councillor Jayne Merrick explained she is looking into where the trees can be planted which is ongoing for next Autumn and will report back to full council once this has been agreed.

258 TO DISCUSS RESIDENT'S REQUEST TO CUT BACK TREES BEHIND THEIR PROPERTY ON ORCHARD PARK

The parish council received a letter from a resident asking for 2/3 trees to be cut back as they are blocking the sunlight into their garden.

The tree officer at SCDC has confirmed that there is no right to light in relation to trees. The clerk explained that the trees nearby that recently had work on them was from the tree

report.

The clerk was asked to respond to the resident explaining what we discussed on item 255, and that we will have the trees inspected.

259 TO DISCUSS CONSULTATION ON OUR LOCAL VALIDATION LIST REQUIREMENTS

The parish council has been asked by Cambridgeshire County Council for comments on their draft local validation check list. This can be found on the parish council website www.sawston.org.uk

260 TO DISCUSS THE CONDITION OF LYNTON WAY PAVILION

The clerk and Councillor Kevin Cuffley explained that when we recently had the emergency lights tested at Lynton Way pavilion, there had be a substantial leak from the ceiling in the main room and there was water in some sockets. This was reported to the clerk who has arranged for an electrician to investigate and make safe.

This room is not suitable for use. This was discussed and agreed for the clerk to arrange a Task & Finish meeting so it can be discussed in greater detail.

261 TO DISCUSS THE RESPONSE FROM SCDC REGARDING THE ASSET OF COMMUNITY VALUE FOR THE KINGS HEAD

SCDC made the decision not to include the Kings Head public house as an ACV, on the grounds that the officers are not satisfied that the principle use of the asset currently furthers the social well-being, cultural, recreation or sporting interests of the local community. It was agreed that this is very disappointing and that as the pub is closed because of the pandemic we should discuss it again in a year and maybe appeal against the decision. This will be made an agenda item for January 2022 full parish meeting.

262 TO DISCUSS GRANT APPLICATION REQUEST FROM SAWSTON SCOUT GROUP

Sawston Scout Group has requested a donation of £2,500 to fund the membership fees charged to them by the Scout organisation of 60 members. Councillor Kevin Cuffley suggested we give the £1,250.00 from reserves as we do want to support them.

It was **PROPOSED** by Councillor Kieran Cooper and **SECONDED** by Councillor David Bard that we offer them £1,250.00 from reserves and to ask them to reapply for this amount.

Councillor Kevin Cuffley explained that Great Shelford parish council has contacted him asking if we can make a comment regarding the proposal. Councillor Kevin Cuffley supports Great Shelford parish council but Councillor Brian Milnes felt that we should not comment as it doesn't greatly affect Sawston.

Councillor David Bard said the southern route would make more sense and would support this. This was discussed further.

Councillor Kieran Cooper explained there is a community event on 25th February at Shelford Rugby Club regarding this if parish councillors wanted to attend.

It was agreed that we would make no comment, not supporting any route.

264 TO DISCUSS CAMBRIDGE SOUTH EAST TRANSPORT (CSET)

Councillor Kevin Cuffley explained there are still issues regarding this route and is awaiting further information.

265 TO AGREE DELIVERY QUOTE FOR CHAIR'S REPORT

The assistant clerk contacted three companies for quotes and only one has responded. The quote for delivering the Chair's report is £199.99 + vat.

County Council Report February 2021

Firstly, apologies if you have already had your Parish meetings, but I thought it would be better to send the report of the February County Council full meeting as this is the Budget setting meeting.

At the meeting it was voted through to accept a 2.99% increase in council tax. This consists of 1.99% normal tax and 1% for Adult Social Care. The council is planning to spend £660.3 million in 2021/22. The amount is an increase of around £47.3 million or 7.7% compared to last year's budget. In reality the council ended up spending £70million more than budgeted over past year because of the pandemic most of financed by central Government.

When the budget was set last year it was estimated it needed to address a budget gap of £4.2 million when setting the budget for 2021/22. Despite planning to make around £4 million savings, the budget gap this for this year due to be closed before the ahead of the meeting was around £9.6 million. The Conservatives introduced a council tax increase of 2.99% as a 'last resort'. The change is a 1.99% is 1% higher than the 1.99% increase previously expected, which is estimated to raise an additional £3 million this year. In addition the Conservatives would not put in an extra £4.1 million into the council's transformation fund, and will withdraw £3.8 million.

The county councils share of the council tax is just over 70% of residents total bill, with district councils and the police and fire services also levying a charge. Tuesday's change will increase the county council's share of the council tax to an average property – Band D – from about £1359.18 a year to £1399.77 a year, an increase of around £40.59 a year on Band D properties.

Government rules allowed the council to raise the council tax by up to 4.99% this year. The Conservative group it would be 'unthinkable' to implement the maximum increase. With the ongoing and likely lasting damage done by the pandemic the Conservatives wanted to protect our residents from the burden of extra taxation.

The county council estimates it will receive £320 million from council tax, £64 million business rates, £122 million for fees and charges and around £136 million from Government grants. Impact on Households. Percentage Increase.

Having listened to the concerns of residents the council will invest a further £29.7 million in Cambridgeshire over the Medium Term Financial Stratagy (MTFS) 2021 – 2026.

The council recognises that we are still in the grips of the Pandemic and that there is a lot of uncertainty in what post pandemic will look like.

It is also pleasing to report that Cambridgeshire has the highest proportion of over 70's vaccinated in the country. With all care homes having received their 1st vaccinations.

It is only right to recognise the giant achievements of the NHS under the stresses they are working, and the remarkable roll out of the vaccinations within Cambridgeshire. With the fantastic support from the volunteers who have played a major role within all our communities. To all a Huge thank you.
