There are no direct costs to sign the Armed Forces Covenant, and it is a great way for your Town or Parish Council to make pledges of recognition and support for the Armed Forces Community.

The covenant is <u>not</u> about giving the Armed Forces Community a special advantage over any other members of society, but it aims to remove or mitigate the disadvantages that the community can face during and after service.

This is not limited to the serving person but their families too, as they can struggle to access good and services due to the nature of service life.

This document aims to explain these disadvantages and demonstrate that we can all play a small part in providing support for the Armed Forces Community.

PRINCIPLES OF THE ARMED FORCES COVENANT

The Armed Forces Covenant is a promise that together we acknowledge and understand that those who serve or have served in the Armed Forces, and their families, should be treated with fairness and respect in the communities, economy, and society they serve with their lives.

Its two principles are that, recognising the unique obligations of, and sacrifices made by, the Armed Forces:

Those who serve in the Armed Forces, whether Regular or Reserve, those who have served in the past, and their families, should face no <u>disadvantage</u> compared to other citizens in the provision of public and commercial services.

<u>Special consideration</u> is appropriate in some cases, especially for those who have given most such as the injured and the bereaved.


